This year the Antelope Valley Amateur Radio Club celebrated the 2022 ARRL Field Day event at the Rawley Duntley Park in Lancaster, CA on June 25th. The club had several different stations including the GOTA (meet & education)



station, QRP (low power) station, CW station, FT-8 (digital) station, Microwave (demonstration) station, and two full 100-watt HF transceiver stations. All ran on



battery power & solar for the duration. The members of the club started to arrive Friday, the day before, to start setting up antennas, stations & overnight RVs. On Saturday the day began with a memorial to our member, Frank N6FOD, who recently became a silent key. During the

The Presentation:

Jeff White is the General Manager of Radio Miami International which provides short wave radio broadcasting to other parts of the world. This includes programs from the Voice Of America to send news to places like Russia and Ukraine that have little to no access to news that is not controlled by the government. In fact to this day, 'Flashpoint Ukraine' is still broadcast daily. Go to Jeff's website and see the schedule there. http://www.wrmi.net/. Using two antennas at 44 degree azimuth, their signal goes up the East Coast of the U.S and Canada then across the Atlantic. The center of the beam goes through London and through Europe and the Middle East. They are able to reach Eastern Europe and Ukraine really well, but as they get further North into Russia it is not the best but it is better than nothing at all. Programs that are re-broadcast include musical programs, dx programs from other countries including Russia, religious

programs and so much more. Check out their website for the schedules of different programs. There is even a program called 'CQ Calling' which is directed at amateur radio operators. Neat stuff. Radio Miami International (WRMI) started out in Miami Florida with one 50 Kw transmitter and one antenna beaming into Latin America. They got the opportunity to move to a larger station with better equipment that was being run by WYFR family radio in Okeechobee Florida almost nine years ago. It is interesting to know that WRMI re-broadcasts programs primarily in English and Spanish to Cuba and Latin America but they also re-broadcast programs from Radio Prague, Slovakia, Argentina, Japan, and others. For many years they have also been re-broadcasting Radio Ukraine up until the Russian invasion. Here comes Kate Neiswender with 'Shortwaves For Freedom' and the idea took root. At the writing of these minutes Jeff is still doing that and much more, not only programs from Voice Of America but also Russian programing from Radio Svoboda. Even though the money from the fundraiser ran out in mid June Jeff is still broadcasting Shortwaves For Freedom because "It's the right thing to do." He did also state that he will continue to as long as he can afford to do so. He has gotten feedback from folks in Ukraine and even Belarus thanking him for his broadcasts.

Radio Miami International, WRMI, does not just do re-broadcasting. They also produce their own programming such as Viva Miami which does interviews and local events. They are there in their community covering

Kate Neiswender who started the fundra-

izer 'Shortwaves For Freedom' has been an Attorney for more than 35 years but she began her career in Radio with Voice Of America and maintains close ties with them to this day. She and another radio person that shall remain anonymous began the fundraizer campaign called 'Shortwaves For Freedom.' It successfully gathered enough funds to keep 'Shortwaves For Freedom' going through Jeff's radio station for a short time until the campaign reached the deadline. It should be noted that as far as Kate knows this was the first time any kind of crowedfunding was used to fund shortwave radio during a wartime conflict. These shortwave broadcasts remain nonpartisan and tell the news and information as sent to them from the source. In fact Voice of America and Radio Free Europe are mandated by congress to be free and fair of any bias from the station. Too bad our own congress can't seem to operate with the same integrity.

WRMI, VOA, and Radio Free Europe remain the stewards of free and fair information without any government interference, not even from former President Trump.

Radio Free Europe even has a Russian language broadcast called 'Radio Svoboda' https://www.svoboda.org/, which WRMI re-broadcasts. It is important to keep these modes of news and information going, not just for countries in conflict, and whose governments aggressively monitor and quash any information that is contrary to their regime's agenda. That does include here in the U.S.

Shortwave radio is the unsung hero of many conflicts over the years, and although many say that shortwave or 'swl' is on its way out nothing could be further from the truth. Shortwave radio has been, and still is, one of THE most efficient ways to broadcast news and events to areas where news is

heavily censored, or banned completely. As long as there is a radio, folks can get real time information in just about any language. No, we should not write off swl just yet, in fact we should do our part to keep it going, right along with our amateur radio.

When Vladimir Putin threw out all the foreign journalists the British immediately, like the moment they were kicked out of Russia, launched their shortwave broadcasts into Russia. The U.S not so much as swl was considered very old technology and therefore not useful. Again, nothing could be further from the truth. Shortwave helped get news and information out during the 80's to get through the Iron Curtain, and is still used in the African Continent, and has proven significantly useful today during this Ukraine conflict. The fundraiser campaign expired but WRMI is still taking donations. PayPal took quite a chunk of the funds so by directly sending to the radio station at least this way the funds will 100% go to broadcasting.

extension cord. The first try running a CPAP on a battery/inverter was at LDRS 2008 (Large Dangerous Rocket Ship) launching amateur sized rockets at Jean Dry Lake, NV. Didn't work out well for the sleep apnea. I did bring a HT and launched an eight-pound bowling ball. Fast forward to the last Field Day. A bigger battery (60 A) only lasted half of Friday night and I just wasn't very useful for Saturday evening. Conclusion: Either get a CPAP machine with a lower current draw or bring a bigger battery. Lesson learned.

For those that use 6 meters, there is a plethora of modes in the six-meter band plan. Back in the 1970s, radio control aircraft became popular. Non ham radio, radio control aircraft operated in the 72 with a Technician ham radio license, a portion of the 6-meter ham band had room in the band plan for telemetry (TM). The hams with RC aircraft had more access time to their planes. Which brings us to the topic of our next meeting featuring Mark Johnson W6WML who will be talking about the Radio Control hobby and how it fits in with amateur radio.
